

During Founder's Day, students will wear their Duck Jackets periodically throughout the weekend. Since the Duck Jackets are property of the current student owner, it is up to the discretion of each student as to whether or not she will display her DJ throughout the weekend. Please enjoy seeing the DJs as students choose to share them, and please respect the wishes of those students who wish not to do so. Thank you!

HANDICAPPED ACCESSIBILITY

Raney Dining Room is accessible through the front entry of Robertson Hall. To enter from the front, use the ramp on the north side of the porch. Enter the parlor through the door on the south side of the porch. The elevator is located through the side parlor to the south. Raney Dining Room is located on the lower level (LL).

A ramp provides access to the first floor only of the **Chapel**. The **Library** has a ramp located at the rear of the building. Assistive listening devices are available in the Center for the Arts, Raney Dining Room, and the Chapel.

SMOKING & TOBACCO-FREE CAMPUS

In accordance with Cottey's student-centered approach to education, commitment to creating a healthy learning environment, and general concern for the well-being of persons' lives, smoking and the use of other tobacco products is not allowed on the Cottey campus. The use or possession of any lighted tobacco products, any type of smokeless tobacco, including electronic cigarettes or other smoking/ vaping devices and chewing tobacco will not be permitted on any College-owned property, including, but not limited to, buildings, grounds, parking areas, walkways, recreational and sporting facilities, and College-owned or leased vehicles.

This policy applies to faculty, staff, students, alumnae, and visitors, and will be in effect during

and after normal campus hours, as well as during all College-sponsored events. In selected areas, "Tobacco-Free Campus" signs will be posted to ensure that all understand Cottey College's commitment to a tobacco-free campus.

SAFETY & CONSTRUCTION

Please use the crosswalks and walk with the traffic lights, as West Austin is well-traveled.

At Founder's 2011, Cottey alumnae accepted the challenge to raise \$2 million toward the construction of a new Fine Arts Building. TODAY the Judy & Glenn Rogers Fine Arts Building is being built. For their efforts, alumnae chose to keep the name Neale Hall for the renovated portion of the new structure.

We know you are curious about the construction, but safety is and will be first and foremost around the site. Visitors are not permitted to pass into or through the fenced area. We also encourage visitors to maintain a safe distance from the fenced area for their protection. Please refrain from distracting the construction crew as they create this marvelous new facility.

A less visible, but equally important, construction project is also happening at this time. With part of the generous \$1 million gift received in 2014, the Helen and George Washburn Center for Women's Leadership is getting an elevator to make that historic building fully accessible. Because of this renovation, the building will be closed to visitors.

CCAA Funds

Below is a list of funds endorsed by the CCAA. Continued support of these funds is appreciated.

ALUMNAE LEGACY SCHOLARSHIP

Cottey College alumnae have given generously to the Alumnae Legacy Scholarship since its inception at Founder's Day Weekend 1999. This special fund helps ensure that the heritage of our alma mater is passed on. What a legacy to leave the next generation!

THE STOCKARD CHAIR OF RELIGION AND ETHICS

Begun by alumnae in 1930, the Stockard Chair of Religion and Ethics is a tribute to founder Virginia Alice Cottey Stockard. Interest generated by the endowment partially supports a faculty position in Religion and Ethics. The Stockard Chair is currently held by Dr. Kevin Rouintree, professor of philosophy.

ROSEMARY ALUMNAE SUITE

Since the 1970s, the Cottey College Alumnae Association has sponsored this suite in Robertson Hall. With funds collected during the Centennial Challenge in 1984, the alumnae association established an endowed fund for Rosemary Suite. Only the accumulated interest from the fund is used to refurbish the suite living area. The suite was last refurbished in the summer of 2010. Alumnae were pioneers in the area of establishing an endowment for a suite.

CCAA Funds

THE DOW INTERNATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The accrued interest from this fund is used to award scholarships to international students. Established in 1973 in memory of Dr. Blanche Hinman Dow, president of Cottey from 1949-65, and initiator of Cottey's active recruitment of international students, the first award was made in the 1977-78 academic year.

THE ALUMNAE GREEN ROOM

Cottey's alumnae made a significant contribution to the Haidee and Allen Wild Center for the Arts through their gifts to the Alumnae Green Room. The funds raised by alumnae were used to offset construction costs and furnishings, plus establish an endowment for the care and maintenance of the room. The Alumnae Green Room is used as a lounge area for actors and actresses, as well as a room for small receptions.

ALUMNAE ENDOWED LIBRARY FUND

Cottey College alumnae, realizing the importance of an excellent library to support the academic program, undertook the task of establishing an endowed library acquisition fund. This fund provides a permanent financial base for the Library, the earnings of which are used to purchase library books, periodicals, and other educational materials. Alumnae contributions up to \$80,000 were matched dollar for dollar by P.E.O. Chapter AK, Massachusetts, which has established a similar endowed library acquisition fund in the name of Blanche Skiff Ross.

Ways to Give

Cottey College continues to plan for growth and improvement to further the mission of the College and its founder. Cottey's commitment to educate women remains firm. The mission is:

Cottey College, an independent liberal arts college, educates women to be contributing members of a global society through a challenging curriculum and a dynamic campus experience. In our diverse and supportive environment, women develop their potential for personal and professional lives of intellectual engagement and thoughtful action as learners, leaders, and citizens.

The Annual Fund, launched in 2013, will help Cottey fulfill its mission and century-long commitment to women's education. It serves as the bridge between what tuition covers and where the endowment funds begin. The unrestricted and renewable gifts to The Annual Fund help provide essentials to women's education, such as financial aid awards, computer and laboratory equipment, course development, athletic equipment, and much more.

The Annual Fund isn't a "catch-all." It's the sum total of the Cottey experience – of everything that makes Cottey, Cottey. Unrestricted dollars from alumnae,

family, and friends play a vital role in sustaining the College each and every day of each and every year.

The beauty of The Annual Fund is that it allows everyone – no matter her means, no matter the size of the gift – the opportunity to give back to our College. Since an Annual Fund donation is unrestricted money, a gift to The Annual Fund in any amount represents a particularly powerful vote of confidence in the College.

The Cottey College Annual Fund represents the solid foundation without which no initiatives could occur. It also looks to the future, because increasing alumnae participation in giving is absolutely vital to the College's well-being in the coming decades.

Key Code: \$ **Tickets Required** Dr. Lynn Frady Kelley spent nearly 40 years in education as an elementary teacher, speech pathologist, a director for communicative disorders, a director for learning skills services and as a consultant on policy analysis and systemwide research for the California Community Colleges. She received her B.A. in Elementary Education at San Francisco State University, M.A. in Educational Supervision at California Polytechnic State University, M.S. in Speech Pathology at Minot State University, an Ed.D. in Higher Education from Brigham Young University, and Diploma from University College in Swansea, Wales, on a Rotary International Fellowship. She retired from Cuesta College as Director of Disabled Student Services, Tutoring and Basic Skills in 2001, and resides in San Luis Obispo, California.

In 1987, Lynn became San Luis Obispo's first woman Rotarian, and in 2001, was named "Woman of Distinction." She has been a Board Member for the San Luis Obispo High School Advisory Committee, Mozart Festival, Achievement House, Literacy Council, and the Friends of Hearst Castle, serving as President from 2008-2010. Lynn is a fourth generation P.E.O. (grand-niece of Supreme Chapter President Carrie B. Simpson); has served her local chapter in numerous capacities, including President; and was a delegate to the 2013 convention of International Chapter.

Throughout the years, Lynn has been devoted to Cottey College. She served as a CCAA Executive Board member from 1990 to 1996. During her final year on the Board she served as President and as an alumnae representative on the Cottey Strategic Planning Committee. In 2010, she accepted the position as Alumnae Committee Chairman for *A Defining Moment* Campaign, enlisting committee members and facilitating plans that increased alumnae participation.

Drs. Judy and Glenn Rogers Alumnae Award – Friends of the college

Judy and Glenn Rogers are a long-time academic team. They met as undergraduates at Centre College, married, then entered the doctoral program in English at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill. They completed their doctoral programs together, even scheduling their comprehensive oral examinations at the same hour of the same day.

They began their teaching careers at Morehead State University in Kentucky, where for a number of years they demonstrated their personal and professional compatibility by sharing the same office. In 1992, Judy became Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of Undergraduate Programs. Glenn continued to teach Shakespeare and English Renaissance literature and in 1995 received the Morehead State Distinguished Teacher Award.

In 1997, they moved to Georgetown College in Kentucky when Judy was named Vice President for Leadership and Ethics, a position she held for seven years. Glenn was an adjunct professor of English and for a time served as Associate Director of Academic Services and then as Associate Academic Dean.

Born in Calfornia and raised in Oregon by two teachers, Sylvia grew up "romping outside", reading, fishing, playing piano, and learning the importance of education. The family studied together around the kitchen table and shared in stimulating conversation. Sylvia strengthened that strong educational foundation while in high school with experiences such as competitive swimming and traveling across Canada and the United States with the United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth. "The framing of a successful life" happened through high school teachers who were P.E.O.s and encouraged her to apply to Cottey College.

At Cottey, Sylvia really learned how to study, while making friends from around the world, working in the Chellie Club and participating in the Model U.N. program. She transferred to the University of Oregon's excellent School of Education, graduated, married, divorced, and found that facing life's challenges leads to inner strength.

With the support and guidance of P.E.O. sisters, Sylvia continued to embrace challenge and serve others. She gained more teaching experience, remarried, raised three children, worked in curriculum development, became a swim official, and participated in a church needlepoint project. When elected to the P.E.O. State Board, she retired from teaching, but maintained connections to Cottey and championed women's education.

Seven years ago (having "failed retirement"), Sylvia and her husband took a risk and moved to Nevada, Missouri. He is now director of instrumental music at Cottey and Sylvia teaches general music in Sheldon. "Being at Cottey has allowed us to open our home to students who have needed a safe place to stay during Christmas, spring and summer breaks", Sylvia says. "These students have ... shared their lives with us, and have taught us to view world events with a broader perspective.

"My parents taught me to dare to dream, to take opportunities that are presented, and to live a life of service to others. Cottey College has been an excellent place to realize my dreams. 'Of those to whom much is given, much is expected'.

"I have been given much. I am grateful." And Cottey is grateful for you, Sylvia! Congratulations on your Alumnae Service Award!

When Judy became the eleventh president of Cottey College in 2004, Glenn retired. At Cottey he has been a writing tutor, a guest lecturer in Shakespeare, an instructor in Vacation College, and the unofficial events planner and tour guide at President's House. Under Judy's leadership the College has increased its emphasis on women's leadership, inaugurated baccalaureate programs, and successfully completed a \$35-million fundraising campaign by raising more than \$40 million.

The Rogers have traveled extensively for Cottey as Judy spoke at international and state P.E.O. conventions, reciprocities, alumnae gatherings, awareness events for the Defining Moment Campaign, and most recently, events for the "Cottey College: Going Places" marketing campaign. They have represented the college in 36 states, one district, two Canadian provinces, and London, England.

In May, they will return to their home in Georgetown, Kentucky. Their plans for retirement may best be described as "evolving over time."

A native of Southwestern Colorado, Mary Beth learned values of equality and service from her mother, and developed a passion for preservation of wild places from outdoor adventures with her dad. She earned a history degree and teaching certificate from the University of Colorado-Boulder, and the nickname "M.B." from Chuck, her husband of 53 years.

After teaching junior high in Boulder, CO, and Palo Alto, CA, MB and Chuck built a home in Loveland, CO, and raised two daughters. MB organized a food co-op, the League of Women Voters, the Hospice of Larimer County and Loveland's first preschool. She played tennis, racquetball, and won two national medals in road bike racing. Already a social activist, MB went on to earn her MSW from Colorado State University, worked with many folks in need and taught at CSU. In 1997, she earned her Ph.D. She became Executive Director of Great Old Broads for Wilderness. Her biggest challenge came after retiring as she became the point person for establishing a homeless shelter in Cortez, CO. The all-volunteer organization of 2006 has become the highly respected, successful and essential Bridge Emergency Shelter. "The land once again beckons," MB says, as she moves from the Bridge to address energy development issues in Southwest Colorado.

"At Cottey, I learned about friendship, academics, self-expression and responsibility... While I didn't know it at the time, my two years at Cottey were the 'defining moment' for me to readily express and act on my personal passions and values. It was a stepping stone that has not eroded after more than five decades.

"My hope for Cottey is that the vision never wavers to provide a nurturing place and time for young women to learn about themselves. It is fundamental to Cottey and those it serves to be owned by women, for women and with women." MB will share Cottey's message, send financial support, and attend reunions as long as she can! MB's advice to Cottey students may sound trite, but is serious: work hard, play fair, do good.

Professor Susan Callahan Alumnae Award – Honorary Alumna

A native of Missouri, Susan Callahan earned her BS and MS in mathematics at the University of Missouri-Rolla (now Missouri Institute of Science and Technology). She joined the faculty at Cottey in 1980 and stayed! She particularly values the desirable teaching environment (class size and teaching load), the opportunity to interact with college employees from every area, be they faculty in other disciplines, staff, admissions reps, secretaries or housekeepers, and the many options for personal enrichment, from wellness programs to student performances. Her high-quality of instruction earned her Cottey's Master Educator Award in 1996 and the Missouri Governor's Award for Excellence in Teaching in 2002.

In addition to teaching mathematics, Professor Callahan has attended numerous professional conferences, presented papers, and currently sits on the Board of Governors in the Mathematical Association of America. She participates in Cottey committee work, helps with student recruitment (e.g., "C-for-Yourself" weekends), and has served as a module leader for European trips.

Professor Callahan values her membership in Nevada's Soroptimist Club, participating in fundraisers to finance donations to organizations that support the interests of women

Ilse's accomplishments includes pages of service and science awards, presentations, natural and chemical science projects and board positions. She worked for 30 years as a research chemist in Medicinal Chemistry at the Upjohn Company in Kalamazoo, in areas that included prostaglandins, antibacterial, antiviral, and anticancer drugs. Two of her anticancer drugs went into clinical trials, and though effective, were found to be too toxic.

After early retirement in 1995, Ilse finally had time to pursue her interests in natural history. With her husband, she helped turn the almost defunct Audubon Society of Kalamazoo into a vibrant birding and environmental organization of more than 350 members. For the last 17 years, she has written nature essays for the Kalamazoo Gazette as well as other publications, and has led presentations on birds, attracting butterflies and moths, and establishing butterfly and hummingbird gardens, for groups from pre-school age through adult, including garden clubs, libraries, nature centers, service clubs, and retirement communities.

Ilse is also a devoted Cottey supporter. The Ilse Gebhard Scholarship, established in 2010, is a generous award that supports Cottey students with preference given to students in upper division environmental studies.

"When I think of Cottey," Ilse says, "three things stand out: excellent education, confidence-building for leadership, and lasting friendships. My two years at Cottey gave me an excellent educational foundation from which to pursue my bachelor's and master's degrees. The highlights of my career as a Medicinal Research Chemist were receiving the Upjohn Award and the Synthetic Chemistry Associates Award. But Cottey gave me so much more. It gave me confidence to say to myself, 'I can be of help here. I can tackle that problem. I can take on a leadership role in this situation.' This confidence helped me become what you might call an amateur naturalist since my retirement 20 years ago. My husband and I share the same interest in nature and have donated land next to our home to a local land conservancy for a 115-acre nature preserve to serve as a refuge for native flora and fauna and a place of enjoyment for future generations."



DIRECTIONS TO VIRGINIA ALICE COTTEY STOCKARD'S GRAVESITE


- Head east on Austin
