





- The MNL is a place of community, welcome, peace, harmony, cultural exchange, and of individual support.



NAIS & Native Strategies

Initiatives and Successes

- ▶ Development of a **Center for Indigenous Knowledge and Data Sovereignty** (2023)
- Implementation of the Home Flight program (2022) and Home Flight Residential Community (2023), which provides free tuition and fees and a first-year community residential experience for federally enrolled Native students who are residents of Oregon.
- Implementation of Native American and Indigenous Studies (NAIS) minor (2013) and major (2021), in consultation with tribal education coordinators
- Collaborative NAIS cluster hire of five positions across five units on campus (2021-22). Additional hire of Indigenous scholar in Journalism and Communications (2024).
- Launch of **UO-Otago Indigenous Studies Exchange** Program (2019)
- Launch of the NAIS Academic Residential Community (NAIS ARC) (2017) and dedication of newest residence hall as Kalapuya Ilihi Hall (2017)
- ▶ Implementation of annual Native PRIDE Awards & Native Graduation Celebrations
- Implementation of Vice President and Advisor to the President on Sovereignty and Gov't-to-Gov't Relations (2015)
- Launch of Native American and Indigenous Studies Research Colloquium (2013)
- **Dedicated Native staff** in Admissions, Advising, CMAE, Counseling Services, and Home Flight

Ongoing Initiatives & Future Plans

- Working with AVP&A and University Development on a strategic fund-raising plan to support Native students and Native-related initiatives, programming, and support
- Increasing Native student recruitment, retention, post-graduation placement, career/professional development, wellness, and mentorship
- ▶ Long term support for **Elders/Scholars/Artists-in-Residence** programs
- Additional faculty hires in the School of Law, College of Education, Department of Psychology, Knight Applied Science Campus, Planning, Public Policy, and Management, and other units
- ► Continued advocacy for Many Nations Longhouse support and expansion
- Developing Native alumni relations

What is Native American and Indigenous Studies?

Native American and Indigenous Studies is an interdisciplinary field that uses multiple approaches from history, anthropology, law, literature, ethnic studies, and other disciplines to understand Native American and Indigenous history, culture, politics, and contemporary lives. In these capacities, and in consultation with tribal education directors, NAIS is the only undergraduate program on campus with explicit commitments to serving Indigenous nations and communities.

Why Native American and **Indigenous Studies?** NAIS affords all students extensive grounding in Indigenous history and culture as well as nuanced understanding of tribal sovereignty, Indigenous nationhood, and the diversity and beauty of contemporary Indigenous lives. In a state with nine federally recognized Indigenous nations and a Native American and Indigenous population 50% higher proportionally than the national average, this knowledge is crucial for future leaders in all fields.

Where Can Native American and Indigenous Studies Take You

NAIS graduates leave the UO prepared to embark on a diversity of professions and career paths, including tribal political leadership, education and administration, higher education, social services and social work, Native language instruction, environmental policy, natural and cultural resources management, law, tribal cultural heritage preservation, the arts, journalism and new media, and community/economic development, to name a few.

Their dedication extends to promoting education, leadership, and cultural awareness, with a commitment to advocating for higher education not only locally but also with surrounding tribal communities. History of Miss Indigenous UO

Since 2019, our Indigenous Ambassadors have been dedicated to strengthening bonds among UO students while creating an inclusive space for the Indigenous community. Their commitment extends beyond campus borders, advocating for education, leadership, and cultural awareness not only locally but also within surrounding tribal communities. In 2023, the roles of Mr. Indigenous and the non-gendered title of UO Cultural Ambassador have been introduced.





Miss Indigenous

•Why?

To represent my tribe and encourage Indigenous youth to pursuing higher education. I want native students to feel comfortable with their Indigenous Identity and continue engaging in their own traditions and culture while at school!

•What do you do?

Attend powwows to share the Mother's Day powwow by public speaking and dancing. Engage in community events and speak about being an Indigenous student and balancing school and traditions. Currently, finishing a film with UO Communications about how native students "walk in two worlds", to influence native youth that they're not alone. Visited Applegate Elementary for Native American Heritage Month. Modeled with the 8th Generation Home Flight Blanket for the Home Flight Scholars program.



Mr. Indigenous

•Why?

 To represent Indigenous men, inspiring positive change and embodying cultural resilience.

•What do you do?

 Engage actively in community events, powwows, conferences, and school visits.



UO Cultural Ambassador

•Why?

Gender-inclusive position for students knowledgeable in their tribe's traditions or tribal researchers, dedicated to cultivating a supportive learning environment and inspiring fellow students to engage in research within their own communities.

•What do you do?

Organize culturally-relevant workshops in collaboration with the Northwest Indian Language Institute (NILI). Currently developing a powwow curriculum for the Native American and Indigenous Studies (NAIS) department, to aid future students understanding of powwow protocol and in general aid powwow planning for Mother's Day. Attend NAIS programming and powwows in the surrounding communities. Host fundraising efforts such as raffles. Part of the Cayuse 5 Research colloquim. Hosted a photographic gallery focusing on Indigenous students, called Ayayat People. Made the UO Royalty Website.

Qualifications

- Must be an undergraduate, graduate, or PhD student at the University of Oregon during the 2024-2025 academic years
- Should have tribal affiliation
- Must maintain good standing grades
- Should feel comfortable dressing in traditional regalia for events
- Submit application by April 15, 2024, at 6:00 PM PST





Traditional Attire

• Contestants are required to proudly wear traditional attire, including ribbon shirts/skirts and regalia, as a powerful expression of cultural identity. This commitment symbolizes the continuity of traditions and fosters a deep sense of pride, contributing to an inclusive space that values and respects diverse cultural expressions. If you need help gathering this, please reach out.

Modern Attire

• Contestants are expected to showcase a fusion of cultural pride and contemporary style by incorporating modern attire into their wardrobe. This requirement allows ambassadors to represent the dynamic intersection of tradition and current trends, highlighting their adaptability and relatability within the University of Oregon community.






Cultural Talent




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
